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# **Homework Guidelines**

#### Rationale

At Beaumaris Primary School, homework caters for the needs of all students and their phase of development. At Beaumaris we recognise home reading as being the most effective homework program. Homework can support higher levels of student achievement by extending the time available for students to consolidate skills and concepts learned at school. Homework can be a means of furthering the school-home relationships and can assist in keeping parents informed about the student's learning and progress. Study and revision programs only become important for students preparing for secondary school.

#### **Principles**

Homework should:

- support the development of the student's independence as a learner
- form part of a developmental learning program that is responsive to individual needs, clearly relevant and supported by classroom practice
- further the partnership between school and home
- avoid dependence on unreasonable levels of parental assistance or resources that are not readily available to the student
- be set without impinging on reasonable time for family, recreational and family pursuits relevant to the students age and developmental level
- be consistently applied and monitored in a whole school approach that is responsive to individual needs and learning requirements

#### Goal

Beaumaris Primary will introduce and follow consistent homework practice across the whole school progressively. Teachers will introduce homework to students at their phase of development. Students will be encouraged to complete homework at an independent level.

## **Objectives**

• Every child will be encouraged to read regularly at home for enjoyment, practise and fluency. To develop a love of literature, books and words.

#### Roles and responsibilities

Teachers, parents and students should work together on providing homework that is realistic and purposeful for the child. Expectations will increase as children move through the phases of development from early childhood to middle childhood.

#### These guidelines are:

- consistent with the Western Australian Curriculum and Assessment Outline and school plans.
- developed in consultation with the school staff and endorsed by the school board.
- regularly communicated to students and parents via school website.
- supported and implemented by all staff.

#### Teachers will ensure that all students in their class are given opportunities to:

- take home reading books so they can read regularly and independently for fluency and enjoyment.
- revise and practice content covered in class depending on the developmental level of the child.
- communicate with or show their parents, what they are learning in class (Seesaw)
- have fun and enjoy learning.
- positively reinforce participation in homework activities but will not apply consequences when homework tasks are not completed.

#### Students will:

- Be encouraged to follow the homework expectations of their Year Level and learning needs.
- Not be expected to complete homework during break times.

#### Parents will:

- Provide their child with a quiet, comfortable, supportive environment to read and work independently regularly.
- Assist their child in time management and organisational skills leading to greater independence as they progress through their Primary School years.
- Praise your child for their efforts, give them honest feedback that will help their learning and communicate with the teacher if there are any problems.
- Be accepting of your child's level of development and have realistic expectations that will support the child and their learning.
- Be encouraging when children are making attempts to learn.

## Creating a supportive environment

It is important in today's busy world that children are given time to relax. It is important to create a balance of relaxation, physical activity, chores, reading and revision of learning tasks. Parents should provide a supportive environment at home where all learning is valued, and children are given a range of opportunities to explore their talents, interests and capabilities.
